Board Policy I-8: Student Progress and Academic Achievement

THE POLICY

The Salt Lake City School District Board of Education will ensure that the district's Standard Educational Program (SEP) is offered at every district school in order to prepare all students to be college and career ready. District students at every grade level will have access to a quality education, based on common standards and strategies, which supports high academic achievement. The district is committed to providing students with equal access and equal opportunity and therefore does not discriminate on the basis of age, color, disability, gender, gender identity, genetic information, national origin, pregnancy, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or veteran status in its programs or services.

The purpose of this policy is to affirm that all district schools will provide instruction and resources that support student success by providing an educational program that meets or exceeds the legal standards for elementary and secondary schools. District-wide efforts will focus on addressing the needs of a wide variety of learners through rigorous curriculum, clear and high expectations for students, differentiated and sheltered instruction, and support for culturally and linguistically diverse students.

Culturally sustaining pedagogy, technology, social-emotional learning opportunities, and prevention of high-risk behaviors will be integrated throughout the curriculum. Curriculum, assessments, and instruction are also aligned with college and career readiness outcomes. Each course must be approved by the teaching and learning department and align with state requirements. All curriculum-related board policies and decisions will be implemented throughout the district.

Minimum standards and expectations for teaching and learning in the district are aligned with the Utah Core Standards as determined by the Utah State Board of Education. School administrators are responsible for providing the SEP using district-approved resources, curriculum, and programs. The board and district employees may adopt additional standards and expectations that extend and enrich the district's curriculum.
