**Playing hooky. Sluffing. Truancy.** Call it what you may, at East High School there are many students who are struggling with chronic absenteeism. This goes beyond the occasional illness or orthodontist appointment—chronic absenteeism is categorized as such when a student misses school two or more times per month, or around 18 days of school in a single school year. According to the Child and Family Policy Center, more than 6.5 million students—or 13% of all students—miss three or more weeks of school per year. 9 out of 10 school districts in the United States experience some level of chronic absenteeism. When looking at data patterns, one thing is clear: across gender, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, and ability, chronic absenteeism peaks in high school more than at any other time in a child's public education. This data impacts students nationwide and right here at East High School.

There are many challenges and frustrations that come with chronic absenteeism: getting behind, slowing the entire class down as teachers must catch students up on their return, in cases of intentional truancy--uncertainty of your child's safety. But the primary concern surrounding chronic absenteeism in high school: **it is the number one risk factor keeping a student from graduating**. In other words: chronic absenteeism during high school has a significant impact on a student's adult life, work, and success after they've entered adulthood. In fact, in a 2005 study by E. Allensworth and J. Q. Easton, it was found that 9<sup>th</sup> grade attendance was a better predictor of student dropout than 8<sup>th</sup> grade test scores. Attendance has little to do with a student's raw academic *talent*; however, academic *performance* is always negatively impacted when classes are missed. We at East are committed to trying everything within the parameters of best teaching practices, education research, and state and district law and policy to help our students get to class. Many of our changes in attendance policy and procedure are because of these factors. We are establishing policies based on what is proven to be best for students' overall well-being. But we cannot encourage good attendance without support from home. We all want the best academic outcomes for your child. And while high school students are often more independent and more responsible, their personal lives, schedules, social circles, and todo lists are increasingly complex. Simply put: they are still kids who need the direction, guidance, and support of all the adults in their life. To help your child regularly attend school, and to ensure you know what happens after you drop them off or they leave the house each morning, please consider the following tips:

Ensure you have your own login and access to PowerSchool separate from your child's login to ensure all contact info is accurate and up-todate.

- Better yet, download the PowerSchool app for the most timely information about your child's academic and attendance record.
- Pay attention to the notifications sent by East High and PowerSchool. These are often connected to your child's attendance and other important schedule information.
- Limit technology use after a certain time each night.
- Establish routines: have your child lay out clothes, pack backpacks and binders, and other items in the evening to ensure an easier morning.



# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

- If you notice your child has missed a class for a reason you haven't sanctioned, have a conversation with them about their attendance and the impacts of absenteeism.
- If your child seems frequently anxious about going to school, • please contact counselors, teachers, administrators, or even other parents about how to best help your child feel more safe and comfortable at school.

It truly takes a village to raise your beautiful children into the intelligent, capable, responsible, accomplished adults we all hope they become. We here at East feel lucky because we see so much of who they are becoming as they transition through adolescence toward adulthood during their time with us. We also know that attending classes and learning all they possibly can is a critical piece in establishing a solid foundation of future success. Please speak openly with your children about the value of attendance. And please feel free to reach out to us if you need any help in ensuring your child takes advantage of every academic opportunity they have here.

## **CHANGING MINDS**

East High theatre students are enjoying the unique experience of collaborating with the original authors of their fall musical. They will present the world premiere of an updated version of the musical *Changing Minds*.

*Changing Minds* is a pop musical written in 2011, specifically for high schools, by David Howard (author of Galaxy Quest) and composer Bret Simmons (music director for countless film and television projects). When East's theater director Kevin McClellan found the musical, he recognized one plot event that could be problematic. In 2011 this event may have been presented as a harmless prank, but in light of recent news events, it could not be taken lightly. McClellan contacted the authors about a possible change, and they not only agreed, they decided to update the entire show.

This past summer, East High actors had the awesome experience of reading through the script with author and composer, which inspired new edits to the show. Howard and Simmons have been involved throughout the rehearsal process as well. East High teachers and students were among the first to receive the new screenplay, and the actors may actually see their suggestions, improvisations, even their in-rehearsal bloopers become part of the new script. This process has been similar to what professional actors do when they originate roles in a new work of theater.

The story: When Natalie (school brainiac) and Kyle (surfer dude) make some spiteful wishes at a magical well, they discover that they have exchanged brains. How will Kyle, inside Natalie's head, keep her from losing her scholarship? How will Natalie keep Kyle from losing his beautiful but demanding girlfriend? A large ensemble cast and pop music enhance this fun teen comedy based on a musical called, *Head Trips*.
